Brief Architectural Description:

Built shortly after 1867 by Hugh Gordon as a rental unit, this house was once inhabited by William Sykes, the postmaster, his wife, four children, and their two dogs. The red brick house has a large central gable with a semi-circular window beneath it, surmounted by a semi-circular radiating arch.

This brick stretcher bond house has a rather wide centre gable in the roof a semi-circular headed ornamental window. The door is quite prominent having sidelights on either side of the doorway separated by heavy bounded mullions. The door and sidelights are recessed and the wood work around the doorway appears heavy. The door itself has six panels. The top two are moulded, while the bottom four are quite plain. On either side of the door is a double hung window with a slightly segmental radiating arch. They are two paned with wooden lugsills. The gable window has a semi-circular radiating arch around its head and it too is double hung and has two panes in it.

There is a one storey addition on the rear and a basement which extends under the main part of the house. There is one single brick chimney on the left or east side of the house toward the back. The eaves are boxed and project several inches over the walls. The soffits are sloped.

William Sykes-Postmaster- lived here in 1885.  
Rented by Hugh Gordon to William Sykes who had two dogs.

Sold in 1897 for \$1,000
