




### **CRIME TRENDS**




- ➤ There were four (4) reports of frauds (including identity theft) in the month of November, which was an increase of one incident from October.
- When comparing year-over-year 2023 to 2022 the number of incidents has decreased by five.




- **7** There were five (5) reported break and enters in the month of November, which was a decrease of three from the previous month.
- **7** When comparing year-over-year 2023 to 2022 the number of incidents has increased by four.




- → There were no reported theft of motor vehicles in the month of November.
- **▶** When comparing year-over-year 2023 to 2022 the frequency of theft of motor vehicle reports has decreased by one.






When comparing year-over-year 2023 to 2022 the frequency of theft from motor vehicle reports has remained the same.

- → When comparing year-over-year 2023 to 2022, the frequency of assaults has increased by seven incidents.



#### INVESTIGATIVE OCCURRENCE

**Break & Enter/Assault:** Police responded to an assault in progress radio call at an apartment building in the downtown area. The complainant reported that he had been asleep in bed when a male and female, both known to him, forced their way into his home and began to assault him. The assault resulted in minor injuries consisting of abrasions and swelling to his face. Both male and female were arrested a short time later.

**Assault:** Police responded to a disturb the peace call at a church in the downtown area. Officers arrived on site and located an intoxicated male party, who had assaulted a security guard. Officers placed the male under arrest, and he was transported to the station and charged accordingly.

**Break & Enter:** Police attended a business in the area of Strathy Road after the front door was observed to be smashed. Through surveillance police were able to determine that at 6:10am an unknown person wearing a disguise smashed the front door to the business and entered. The unknown person made off with cash. A grey 4 door sedan, no license plate obtained, was noted at the scene. This investigation is ongoing.

Weapons: Police received multiple calls regarding the sounds of gunshots heard in and around King Street East near McGill Street. Police arrived in the area and spoke to witnesses. Police conducted an extensive patrol around the area and through investigation it was determined to be firecrackers that had been set off from a moving vehicle.

**Theft:** Police responded to a theft after the fact call at a business in the downtown area. It was reported that an unknown male was observed reaching over the counter and removing a tray of lottery tickets. The male was confronted by a staff member, but he continued to leave the store without making any attempts to pay. This investigation is ongoing.

**Disturbance:** Police were dispatched to a business in the downtown area for a report of two males engaged in a physical altercation. Police arrived on site and separated the males who were both known to police. No physical injuries, and neither wished to provide formal statements.

**Motor Vehicle Collision – Personal Injury:** While Police were on general patrol, they were dispatched to a report of a male who had just been struck by a vehicle. Officers arrived on scene and located a male who had been riding a bike, with his leg pinned under a tire of a vehicle. Police were able to free the male, and he was assessed by paramedics at the scene. Through investigation it was learned that the vehicle driver had made a left-hand turn and struck the cyclist. The driver was charged under the *Highway Traffic Act*.

**Robbery:** Police received a report of an assault near a business in the mid town area. The investigation revealed that a male, known to police, had approached, and grabbed a youth and demanded money. Police located the male, and he was subsequently arrested and charged.

**Police Assistance:** Police were called to a school in the Town of Cobourg for a student who was reportedly in a heightened state. Due to this, the school was placed in a lock down. Staff on site were able to de-escalate the situation and the lockdown was lifted. No direct threats were made, and no weapons were involved in this situation.

**Obstruct Arrest:** Cobourg Police received a report of a suspicious person at an address located in the East end of Town. The caller stated that while she parked her vehicle, an unknown male entered her vehicle and refused to exit despite numerous requests. Police arrived on scene and located the male in the general vicinity. The suspect refused to identify himself or speak to police despite numerous cautions for obstructing a peace officer. As a result, the male was arrested and charged with numerous offenses including Mischief, Probation order-noncompliance, and obstructing a Public or Peace Officer. The male was held for a bail hearing and remanded into custody.
