Highlights of 2020 SCCAC Work

- Context: due to COVID, the SCCAC met four times in 2020
- Key accomplishments (in order of event):
 - Council endorsed the SCCAC recommended definition of sustainability
 - Council supported SCCAC's request to work with other Advisory
 Committees to help them carry out their mandate from a climate emergency lens
 - Supported Council to send letters to the Premier and other provincial and municipal politicians supporting the recommendation of the Clean Air Alliance for the province to phase out gas-fired electricity generate by 2030 -

Conclusions

- The Integrated Community Sustainability Plan (ICSP) and Green Development Standard (GDS) were delayed due to COVID and limited staff resources in Planning Department
- Planning Dept resources addressed somewhat will need more staff if Cobourg is to address the climate emergency – much of the necessary work will need to be done by this Department
- Key concern of SCCAC is that developments are proceeding <u>now</u> that are not sustainable – will worsen climate crisis – reflected in 2021 Work Plan

SCCAC 2020 Work Plan

CONTEXT

- On Dec 2, 2019 Council declared a Climate 'emergency' conveying its recognition that we are facing an *unprecedented* crisis requiring unprecedented climate mitigation measures;
- COVID has taught us how government responds to an 'emergency'
 - Businesses shut down within days; some will be lost forever
 - Some people lost their jobs; higher use of food banks;
 - Some countries increased malnutrition, starvation; reoccurrence of other diseases due to other immunization programs being stopped (polio, measles, malaria);
 - People being isolated; not being with loved ones when they die;
 - Children lost valuable school years; increase in drug overdose, mental health issues, domestic violence; other health issues postponed; etc


Climate Crisis Worse

- The Climate Crisis is an emergency of a worse scale than the pandemic
- It is presently having, and will continue to have, way more severe consequences, and they will be much longer lasting
- We really need to absorb this have a higher fear of the climate crisis than we have of getting COVID.
- Relationship between global heating and increase in pandemics, and in lowering community and individual resilience to pandemics.


Much of the Focus of the SCCAC 2021 Work Plan is to Address Sustainable Development



Highest Sources of GHG

Key Recommended Work Plan Activities

- Support other advisory committees to apply climate lens
- Provide comment on Zoning-By Law Review
- Determine if there are ways to achieve more sustainable developments while awaiting ICSP and GDS
- Identify relationship between urban density and the climate crisis; educate on this relationship
- Provide comment on draft ICSP and GDS
- Review relevant County initiatives for impact on Cobourg
- Assist with implementing Climate Action Plan as needed

Key Immediate Issue for Cobourg

- Cobourg is facing many development applications now in various stages of the approval process
- It is less costly to ensure they are sustainable now than to retrofit later. FCM: for every \$1 spent now, save \$6 in future costs
- Given we are facing an 'emergency' with dire consequences for human civilization unless we act fast, what can we do now to ensure sustainable development in Cobourg in the interim of GDS and Affordable Housing CIP being implemented?
